"Permitted uses in industrial zones" already vaguely describes bowling centers and the accompanying activities usually associated with such business as being permitted under C/I zoning. Public facilities for athletic events are already permitted as are athletic clubs, and restaurants, but all under different uses. One use line covering bowling centers with restaurant/bar, and continuous indoor and outdoor activities would permit items that are separately allowed in table 19.58.020-1, but would clarify that their combined use is permitted.
