- Recreation staff presented to the Longview Public School Board on Out-of-School Programs and our 24 yearlong partnerships. Without this partnership, Longview Parks & Recreation would not be able to conduct over 250 days of Out of School Programs without the support of the Longview Schools. **Goals: I, II, III**
- Running of the Fools run/walk was held April 1st at Willow Grove Park. There were 40 people who participated in a one-lap race around the Willow Grove Loop (10K). Staging was at the Shelter where participants were treated to snacks and music. Cowlitz Valley Runners co-sponsored the event and provided volunteers out on the course. Runners enjoyed the path, received a lot of gift certificates from local businesses, and everyone finished the race! **Goals: I, II, III**
- 22nd annual Earth Day Celebration occurred on Saturday, April 15 at the Cowlitz County Expo Center. This is a major community-wide event which attracts over 4,000 visitors. It is a collaborative effort from the City of Longview Recycling and Stormwater department, Cowlitz County Public Works, Ecological Land Services, and Parks and Recreation. Over 40 exhibitors were present and the entertainment was funded by Waste Control Recycling, Emerald Kalama Chemical, Steelscape LLC, Ecological Land Services, Inc., Solvay Chemicals, CCS – A Division of PNE, Cowlitz PUD, and PNW Metal Recycling. The Council recognized the event by presenting a

Proclamation at the April Council Meeting. There were 27 highschool volunteers that helped with various aspects at the event. **Goals: I, II**

- The annual Kids Fish-In was a smashing success and was a sold-out event. Volunteer-extraordinaire, Gerry Bosh, was instrumental for helping organize and conduct the event. The Lions Chuckwagon was on hand to serve all the participants and volunteers with free hot dogs, soda and chips. They also sold to the public. We had over 50 volunteers from local clubs and high schools. At least 15 of the large trout (4-8 lbs) were caught which caused a lot of excitement. **Goals: I, II, III**
- We hosted the regional Special Olympics Swim meet at Mark Morris Pool on April 15 & 16. Teams from all over Western Washington competed in the two day event. Around 200 athletes swam and earned medals. Some qualified for the state tournament in June. Many local volunteers helped put the event on. **Goals: I, II, III**
- 109 of 126 Garden spaces have been rented as of the end of April. Although the ground is wet and we are waiting for temperatures to rise for optimal planting, the operations surrounding the gardens are operational – a porta pod was delivered and water has been turned on. **Goals: I, II, III**
- The Spring Garden potluck was held at the Woman's Club on April 27 and had 28 people in attendance. Jon Griffin presented information on fertilizing and other gardening topics. Prizes were given out such as rakes, shovels, tomato starts, seeds, gloves, fertilizer which the garden board helped collect from local businesses. Two gardeners won free plot tilling by Russell's Tractor Service. **Goals: I, II**
- The third date night of our new Date Night Series was a sold-out success! Holo's Yoga Studio & Roland Wines were the hosts of the evening. The purpose of the Date Night Series is to showcase locals businesses and provide couples, friends, and individuals with entertainment and recreational opportunities locally. Next up is Ladies Night on the Range, June, 9th. **Goals: I, II, III**
- Recreation staff conducted their 3rd round of stakeholder meetings. These meetings are designed to bring outside perspectives on recreation services and opportunities to our staff. After completing a stakeholder meeting, our staff shares the thoughts and perspectives of our stakeholders amongst the team. **Goals: I, II, III**
- A big thank you to our Summer Brochure Sponsors: Cowlitz County & Area Agency on Aging & Disabilities of SW Washington. **Goals: I, II, III**
- The Recreation team participated in two community outreach events. The LCC Job Fair & Safe Kids. Between the two events we reached approximately 500 attendees and were able to share information about our programs. **Goals: I, II, III**
