



STATUS OF ENHANCEMENTS TO PARK PLAZA






R.A. LONG PARK UPGRADES - HISTORY

- RA Long Master Plan completed 2010
 - Open house; public input; HPC and Park Board approval; Council adopted plan
- Park Improvements Phase 1
 - Relocate RA Long bust completed 2015
 - Replace central concrete plaza, construct water fountain, provide ADA approach to plaza, lighting – project advertised in 2016; not awarded due to funding shortage
 - Central concrete plaza and portions of lower plaza removed to eliminate safety hazards – completed 2016

R.A. LONG PARK - CONSIDERATIONS


- □ Goals for the Park
- Consider Park Feature Options
 - Fountain
 - Gazebo or pavilion
 - Eliminate concrete plaza
- Master Plan Update
 - □ Public Input
 - Historic Preservation Commission and Parks Board approval
 - City Council

Option 1 — Replace upper and lower plaza and steps; new colored red and aged grey concrete; construct fountain; ADA access to plaza




- Updated cost estimate with concrete plaza and fountain feature
- □ Total Cost \approx \$746,000
 - Engineering: \$46,000
 - Construction: \$600,000
 - Contingency: \$100,000

Option 2 - Replace upper and lower plaza and steps; new colored red and aged grey concrete; gazebo; ADA access to plaza



- Concrete plaza and gazebo
- Gazebo options: oval, rectangular, octagon, wood, vinyl, benches, lighting, electrical
- Cost estimate includes: standard 30' octagonal vinyl gazebo with benches, electrical packet and outlets on concrete pad (no gazebo floor)
- Total Cost \approx \$680,000
 - □ Engineering: \$60,000
 - □ Construction: \$525,000
 - Contingency: \$95,000

Option 3 – Replace lower concrete plaza; new colored red and aged grey concrete; upper concrete plaza replaced with grass; gazebo with concrete sidewalk approach and ADA for access



- Gazebo with grass plaza
- Gazebo options: oval, rectangular, octagon, wood, vinyl, benches, lighting, electrical
- Cost estimate includes: standard 30' octagonal vinyl gazebo with benches, electrical packet and outlets on concrete pad (no gazebo floor)
- Total Cost \approx \$534,000
 - Engineering: \$60,000
 - Construction: \$398,000
 - Contingency: \$76,000

Other recommended park improvements

- Upgrade park lighting system and power receptacles
 - **\$63,000**
- Upgrade electrical service
 - **556,000**
- Additional sidewalk repairs in park to remove safety hazard
 - **575,000**

R.A. LONG PARK - FUNDING STATUS



- Current Available Funding \$375,000
 - Kuntz Family Trust Fund
 - **\$300,000**
 - Donation
 - \$75,000 pledge
 - State Capital Budget Request
 - \$296,000 (legislature has not adopted capital budget)
- Prior Expenditures
 - \$100,000 project design/bidding; R.A. Long bust relocation; plaza removal

R.A. LONG - POTENTIAL ADDITIONAL FUNDING SOURCES

- Allocate funds from other capital projects
 - Playground equipment replacement (budgeted at \$45,000 in each of 2017 and 2018; \$45,000 intended as CDBG match for Kellogg Park playground)
 - ADA Improvements (budgeted at \$100,000 in 2018)
 - Others?
- Apply for grant opportunities
 - Heritage Capital Project Grant funding available in 2019-2021 state budget if appropriated
 - Kuntz Memorial Trust Fund

R.A. LONG PARK - NEXT STEPS

- Confirm or update project master plan
 - Desired uses and features
 - Future maintenance
 - Historic preservation
- Determine funding
- Determine project timeline
- Determine phasing
- Obtain Historic Preservation Commission and Parks Board concurrence







FACILITY USE AGREEMENTS

LEAGUES AGREE TO:

- Responsible for Field & Building Maintenance,
 Equipment, & Restrooms.
- Pay reduced 25% rates for Garbage, Electricity, & Water/Sewer
 - Resolution Nos 2192 & 2193
- Fund & Install Improvements/Repairs
- Provide Insurance/Health Permits

CITY AGREES TO:

- Allow Use Free of Charge/Discount Utilities
- Maintain General Public Park Areas
- Act as Liaison and Support for Park Needs
- Provide Neighborhood Park Grant Funds

CURRENT FACILITY CONCERNS

- Year Round Responsibility
- Security/Vandalism
- Restrooms
- Regular Maintenance
- Equipment Purchases
- Large Capital Improvements

FUTURE OF SPORTS IN LONGVIEW

CONTINUE ON SAME PATH

- Teams/Participants traveling out of City
- Loss of leagues
- Facility responsibility back to the City
- Degradation of facilities or removal

MAKE A PLAN FOR THE FUTURE

- Determine goal and mission of the sports/park facilities
- Explore/Invest in park infrastructure for the future of the facilities
- What other cities are doing

HISTORY - PARK USE

- Historically, parks were seen as a place for passive use
- Organized events in the summer were discouraged except Go 4th & Concerts
- Fun Runs were coordinated in spring and fall to not interfere with summer park users
- The goal was not to turn parks into a marketplace
- User groups were turned away from parks as a place to hold events – noise/people
- Park Impact Concern—physical, monetary, labor

- Turning Parks into a Community Gathering Place
- Quality of Place/Tourism



SPECIAL EVENT PERMITS

PRICING

- Based on 5 Hour Event/Number of Attendees/Facility
 - Fundraising Event Charging Admission
 - Non-Fundraising Event Free Public Event
 - Sport Field Rentals

RULES & REGULATIONS

- Insurance Requirements
- Vendor Requirements
- Park Rules
- Reimbursable Costs for Labor/Damage
- □ **EQUITY IN PERMITTING** Same for all permit holders

VISION FOR FUTURE USE

- Minimize Park Impact/Cost while maximizing use
- Fair & Equitable
- Permissible Activities
- Increased Partnerships
